Biblical Topics

Trinity

It may surprise you to learn that the word Trinity is not in the Bible. It was reportedly coined by an Early Church scholar named Tertullian, who is the oldest known Latin writer to use the term Trinity, as well as the earliest writer to give us a formal explanation of a trinitarian theology. The word triune simple means "three in one." (Portals of Prayer – 6/15.14)

The only true God is the Triune God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, three distinct Persons in one divine Being or Essence. Still there are not three Gods, but ONE God; nor is each of them a third God. An illustration from life would be the apple. It has an outer skin, flesh and the core. Yet it is only one apple.

- Deuteronomy 6:4: Hear, O Israel: The LORD our God, the LORD is one. ⁵ Love the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength.
- 1 Corinthians 8:4 We know that an idol is nothing at all in the world and that there is no God but one.
- Matthew 28:19: Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.
- 2 Corinthians 13:14: May the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all.
- Matthew 3:16-17: At Jesus' baptism the Father spoke from heaven and the Spirit descended in the form of a dove.

The three divine Persons are distinguished from each other. To the Father especially is ascribed the work of Creation; to the Son, the work of Redemption; to the Holy Spirit, the work of Sanctification. The "especially," is used because none of these works is exclusively the work of the Person to whom it is primarily ascribed.

- Psalm 2:7: I will proclaim the decree of the LORD: He said to me, "You are my Son; today I have become your Father.
- John 15:26: When the Counselor comes, whom I will send to you from the Father, the Spirit of truth who goes out from the Father, he will testify about me.
- Galatians 4:6: Because you are sons, God sent the Spirit of his Son into our hearts, the Spirit who calls out, "Abba, Father."
